America Recycles Day

America Recycles Day is a nationallyrecognized day that celebrates and promotes
recycling in the United States and falls on
November 15th. On this day, people are
encouraged to spread the word about recycling
and to practice recycling themselves. So be sure
to find a recycling program near you so that you
can recycle your trash instead of dumping it the
garbage to fill up yet another landfill.

Recycling a single aluminum can saves enough energy to power a television for three hours. Yet, every three months, Americans toss enough aluminum into landfills to rebuild the entire U.S. fleet of commercial airplanes, according to the National Recycling Coalition.


Using recycled materials also saves energy and reduces global warming. For example, using recycled glass consumes 40 percent less energy than using new materials. Americans also contribute to recycling by purchasing products with recycled content, less packaging and fewer harmful materials.

Recycling helps to conserve natural resources and reduce greenhouse gas emissions that contribute to global warming. According to the Environmental Protection Agency, recycling one ton of aluminum cans saves the energy equivalent of 36 barrels of oil or 1,655 gallons of gasoline.

Recycling not only saves space in landfills, reuses important resources and saves energy but it also prevents the needless destruction of many aquatic animal species and helps in the fight against global warming. So spend this day figuring out how you can recycle more.

Did you know that the average American produces about four pounds of trash per day? Over 80% of all household waste can be recycled. Many things such as magazines, cans, plastic bottles, newspapers, and cardboard can be recycled.

To get started recycling, ask your parents for a place to store your recyclables. Separate the cans in one container, newspaper and paper in another container, plastics in the next container, and cardboard in the next. Then when your containers are full, take them to one of the recycling drop off sites in the County.




